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Christ the Redeemer

Christians and Catholics around the world worship the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. In Brazil there are also a lot of Christians. They made a statue of Jesus Christ called Christ the **Redeemer**. Millions of people around the world come to see it. Even non-Christians or Catholics come to see Christ the Redeemer.

How was Christ the Redeemer built?

Statues can take a long time to build. One of those statues that took a long time was Christ the Redeemer. The creators picked out Mount Corcovado to build the statue on. Construction was overlooked by an


engineer named Silva Costa. They started construction on the statue on the mountain and resources were transported up via railway. Clay molds

gradually extended upwards and once they built the core they covered the statue in tiles made out of a rock called **soapstone**.

Christ the Redeemer was built to honor Isabella, princess **regent** of Brazil and the daughter of Emperor Pedro II. The French sculptor Paul Rodin who collaborated with Silva Costa has been credited as the primary designer of the head and hands. Construction started on April 9th 1922 and was finished on October 12 1931. That is nine years of total construction. It cost 250,000 U.S. dollars which is 3,000,000 U.S. dollars today. The construction of Christ the Redeemer was a hard and long process but in the end it was successful.

panel of experts felt it qualified to be nominated based on predetermined **criteria**, then after that the public voted it to be on the list. Without the statue being famous or the qualities it has, who knows where it might be today.




This is a picture of the Sirat mountains; the only place people can gain entrance to the city.

Vatican City


Roman Catholics live in every part of the world. Did you know that there is a city where only Roman Catholics live. That place is called Vatican City and it has a lot of famous places and people.

Who Built It?

For almost two thousand years, people have been traveling to Vatican City to see the many celebrations that take place at St. Peter's Basilica. St Peter's is a church that took one hundred and fifty years to build, starting on April 18, 1506. Paul V adopted Carlo Maderno's plan, giving the church the form of a Latin Cross by extending the **nave** to the east, thus completing the 615 ft. long main

structure. He also completed the **facade** of the Basilica, and added an extra bay on each end to support **campaniles**. All in all, this building's original design has been changed multiple times.

Glossary

Campaniles- an Italian bell tower, especially a freestanding one

Cardinals- a cardinal is a senior member of the clergy of the church.

Chapel- a small building for Christian worship, typically one attached to a institution or a private house

Criteria- a principle or standard by which something is judged or decided

Enclave- a portion of territory within or surrounded by a larger territory whose inhabitants are culturally or ethnically distinct

Facade- the face of a building, especially the principal front that looks onto a street or open space

Kaaba- a small stone building in the court of the Great Mosque at Mecca that contains a sacred black stone and is the goal of Islamic pilgrimage and the point toward which Muslims turn in praying

Mosque- a building used for public worship by Muslims

Nave- the central part of a church building, intended to accommodate most of the congregation. In traditional Western churches it is rectangular, separated from the chancel by a step or rail, and from adjacent aisles by pillars.

Pilgrimage- a journey to a place associated with someone or something well known or respected

Quran- the Islamic sacred book, believed to be the word of God as dictated to Muhammad by the archangel Gabriel and written down in Arabic

Redeemer- a person who redeems someone or something soft rock consistently largely of talc

Regent- a person appointed to administer a country because the monarch is a minor, absent, or incapacitated.

Risotto- an Italian dish of rice cooked in stock with other ingredients such as meat or vegetables

Shrines- a place regarded as holy because of its associations with a divinity or a sacred person or relic, marked by a building or other construction

Soapstone- a soft rock consistently largely of talc

Sovereign- a supreme ruler, especially a monarchy

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
