

## Poetry Unit – C.F.

Poetry - a type of literature, or artistic writing, that attempts to stir a reader's imagination or emotions. The **poet** does this by carefully choosing and arranging language for its meaning, sound, and rhythm. In this unit, we will discuss and create 4 types of poems: Acrostic, Haiku, Limerick, and Rhymes.

### **1. Acrostic - A Name Poem that describes characteristics of the word. It uses the letters of the word as the first letter of each line.**

Examples:

**Nicky**

**by**

**Marie Hughes**

Nicky is a Nurse

It's her chosen career

Children or Old folks

Kindness in abundance

Year after year

**2. Haiku Poetry - A Japanese poem composed of three unrhymed lines of five, seven, and five syllables. Haiku poetry reflects on some aspect of nature and creates images.**

**Ex:** Falling to the ground,  
I watch a leaf settle down  
In a bed of brown

**Ex:** The wind is blowing  
It is blowing very hard  
I don't like the wind.

3. Limerick - A short humorous poem consisting of five lines. Lines 1, 2, and 5 of a Limerick have seven to ten syllables and rhyme with one another. Lines 3 and 4 have five to seven syllables and also rhyme with each other.

**Ex:** There once was an ape in a zoo  
Who looked out through the bars and saw YOU!  
Do you think it's fair  
To give poor apes a scare?  
I think it's a mean thing to do

**Ex:** There once was a poor boy named Sid  
Who thought he knew more than he did  
He thought that a shark  
Would turn tail if you bark  
So he swam out to try it --- poor kid!

- 4. Rhyme - types of poems which have the repetition of the same or similar sounds at the end of two or more words most often at the ends of lines. This technique makes the poem easy to remember and is therefore often used in Nursery Rhymes.**

**Ex:** Humpty Dumpty sat on a wall,  
Humpty Dumpty had a great fall.  
All the King's horses, And all the King's men  
Couldn't put Humpty together again!

**Ex:** Hey diddle diddle, the cat and the fiddle,  
The cow jumped over the moon.  
The little dog laughed to see such a sport  
And the dish ran away with the spoon!
